Matthew 3: 1-12

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.

"I baptize you with water for repentance, but one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor and will gather his wheat into the granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

Courtyard Commerce Today

It's Advent, the season of waiting for the wondrous things that are coming. That said, there's a lot going on right now. The younger children will hear the story of the Angel Gabriel's visit to Mary and be introduced to the many symbols of Advent. We'll also debrief today's Virgin of Guadalupe pageant and introduce Santa Lucia who will be with us next week.

Meanwhile upstairs the older children will review essential Advent information as they prepare for today's Courtyard Commerce. Just in time for holiday gift wrapping, we'll be selling bags of hand crafted gift tags. The goal is to provide blankets, socks and hygiene supplies for the Gubbio Project operating at St. John's Episcopal Church in the Mission District.
