

that we might walk in solidarity with all those in pain.

Great Comforter, we pray for all who have died and now reside in your house forever: grant them eternal rest and lovingly surround those who mourn with the hope of your promise of life everlasting. We especially remember (N.) and others you may now name. Christ has risen--

so that the sting of death is overcome.

The Celebrant concludes the prayers with the following Collect:

O God, Great Shepherd of promise and hope, we glory in your power and give thanks for your son, Jesus Christ, the Good Shepherd, who is with us always, is one of us, and yet is one with you. Look favorably upon us that we will flourish in your life-giving grace and eagerly follow the way that leads to you; through Jesus Christ and in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. *Amen*.
