A Reading from the Letter of Paul to the Romans.

What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written, "For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered." No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.



Prayers Of The People

O God, lover of concord, we pray for our church and the world that we will be instruments of your peace.

For peace throughout the world, that a spirit of respect and forbearance may grow among nations and all people, we pray to you, O God:

Where there is hatred, let us sow love.

For those who do harm to others, for those who commit acts of terrorism and destruction, that as your people we may grow ever more deeply in your spirit of justice and peace, we pray to you, O God:

Where there is injury, let us sow pardon.

For all who believe in you and all whose faith is known to you alone, that we may be delivered from the darkness of fanaticism and from the pride that arises from wealth and comfort, we pray to you, O God:

Where there is discord, let us sow union.

For those who have lost their faith in you, for those whose mourning seems endless, may your people offer comfort and hope, we pray to you, O God:

Where there is doubt, let us sow faith.

For the persecuted, the lonely, the sick and all those whose spirit has been broken and whose lives have been irrevocably disrupted. We pray to you, O God:

Where there is despair, let us sow hope.

For the mission and ministry of your Church; that we may listen to your Word of reconciliation and proclaim it through our actions, we pray to you, O God:

Where there is darkness, let us sow light.

For all who died in the terror of September 2001, and those victimized in the endless cycle of racial violence, senseless acts of hatred and war, and the toll of disease, infection and climate disruption. For all of them and for others whom we remember today. (*A moment of silence is held.*) We trust that they have entered a new realm of being in your presence, we pray to you, O Lord:

Where there is sadness, let us sow joy.

We pray for our own concerns and needs and for those of this congregation.

Grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood, as to understand; to be loved as to love.

We take heart in thanksgiving that through Christ's life and resurrection, we may reach fullness of being during our years on earth and for evermore.

For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we reborn to eternal life.

The Celebrant concludes the prayers with the following Collect.

Eternal God of all peoples and races, you made us in your image: Look with compassion on the whole human family; take away the arrogance and hatred which infect our hearts; break down the walls that separate us, unite us in bonds of love; and work through our struggle and confusion so that the day will come when all humanity will recognize that it is one family, and serve you in harmony and peace. *Amen.*

Forgive, restore, and strengthen us through our Savior Jesus Christ, that we may abide in your love and serve only your will. Amen.

The Holy Communion

All seeking God are welcome at Christ's Table.

For those worshiping in person, please allow the altar party and choir to receive communion before approaching the Communion rail. The Celebrant will place the wafer into your outstretched palm taking care not to touch your hand. After being given the consecrated bread, take it back to your place while remaining masked. Once you have returned to your place, you are invited to remove your mask, receive Communion, and replace your mask.

- ◆ *If you prefer a gluten-free wafer, simply ask the priest for one at the time of Communion.*
- ◆ *If you would prefer a blessing instead of the Bread, please cross your arms over your chest.*
- ◆ *Communion is currently being offered in one kind. The full grace of the sacrament is received with only the bread.*

Those worshiping at home are invited to pray the following from St. Augustine's Prayer Book:

O Christ,

I believe that you are truly present in the Holy Sacrament, and, since I cannot at this time receive communion, I pray you to come into my heart. I unite myself with you and embrace you with all my heart, my soul, and my mind. Let nothing separate me from you; let me serve you in this life until, by your grace, I come to your glorious kingdom and unending peace. Amen.

ANNOUNCING ST. MARY'S FALL WORSHIP SUNDAY SERVICES

As we enter September, our common life at St. Mary's continues to evolve as we prepare for another program year. Starting Sunday, Sept. 19, we will expand to two in-person worship services at 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m.

The 9:00 a.m. Courtyard Eucharist Service will be family oriented, interactive and will include classic hymns and music offered by the children's and youth choirs. The 9:00 a.m. service will conclude with a faith formation component for both adults and children. K-6 Sunday School instruction will be offered during 30-minute classes while adults remain in the courtyard to discuss and explore the rich message of the day's Gospel and other topics of interest.

The 11:00 a.m. Eucharist service with parish choir will be held inside the church

and will closely resemble our "Simple Summer" 10:00 a.m. indoor service. The 11:00 a.m. service will be live streamed on St. Mary's website and Facebook page and may be accessed later in the day or week.

No reservations are needed to attend either service. Child care will be offered during both services. Look for more detailed information about Sunday school on our website and other communications.

We at St. Mary's continue to be mindful of prioritizing the health and safety of our community and the ongoing challenges posed by the Delta and any future variants. Our Sunday in-person services and Sunday School classes will adhere to prevailing city, county and diocese health and safety protocols. Currently, these include masks indoors and appropriate distancing. Also, we understand if you and your family are not ready to return to in-person services and programs. If you'd like to discuss your decision, hesitations or simply can't make up your mind, please reach out to any member of the clergy.
